Letter from the CEO

It was a great honor to have been chosen late last year to run this impactful organization. Having been on the BNT team for over 7 years, I am prepared and eager to assume this leadership role. As is the case in transitions, my first responsibility has been to hit the ground running, to lead by example, and to support the great work of my fellow employees.

2021 was a busy year as we served nearly 6,000 people. While COVID-19 continued to have devastating effects on the housing

stability of the low and moderate -income population we serve, we made great strides to help those in need. We provided affordable housing to some 36 housing insecure individuals in sites such as the newly completed West Liberty Commons, pictured on the cover page of this report, and helped nearly 4,200 families gain access to the UniteCT federal rental assistance program to avoid eviction.

At the end of 2021 we hosted a very successful fund-raising event highlighted by the keynote address of M&T Chairman René Jones. The event also welcomed attendee Governor Ned Lamont.

Looking ahead, we will continue to meet our mission of providing sustainable affordable housing for vulnerable populations and running housing counseling programs for

those looking to improve their finances to purchase or remain in their own home. We're also excited about the projects in the pipeline. They include our new homeowner-occupied, affordable housing project called South End Commons. Also, we will try to keep others in their homes through our rental assistance and foreclosure prevention programs. In addition, we will administer the City of Bridgeport's down-payment assistance program for new homeowners.

I feel the great need to thank all our funders who continue to make this all possible. Together we have every reason to be optimistic for BNT's future. I'm proud to be at the head of an organization with such a great and noble cause. [Click to see Doris' video.](#)

Empowerment Resource Academy (ERA)

ERA's focus is to assist families in achieving and maintaining better and more affordable housing, attain financial stability, build wealth, and remain self-sufficient. ERA accomplishes this by providing pre-purchase education and counseling, rental assistance, and eviction and foreclosure prevention services. BNT staff also guides ERA participants to available free social services in the community, including job training, health care, and childcare.

BNT is one of two agencies statewide to provide Fair Housing Counseling, to counsel those that may have suffered housing discrimination. Furthermore, BNT was the only recipient of a special 2021 Department of Housing Fair Housing (HUD) COVID-19 grant in its Rhode Island, Massachusetts, and Connecticut geographic region.

In 2020 Bridgeport Neighborhood Trust changed its name to Building Neighborhoods Together, thus representing a wider footprint in the state. In the past ERA served mostly Fairfield County clients, of which about 80% came from Bridgeport. In 2021, however, as many as half its clients came from outside of Fairfield County. Real Estate Development

BNT is the most active nonprofit developer of affordable housing in Bridgeport, having invested \$49 million in Bridgeport over the last 15 years, including some 225 units and 27,000 sq. ft. of commercial space.

In 2021, we completed the West Liberty Commons project, which included 18 townhouses in downtown Bridgeport, housing some 36 tenants. By building and renovating quality affordable homes we are providing new housing opportunities for low and moderate-income families.

In the last seven years BNT has built larger affordable housing. Ninety-six, or 2/3rds of the total units, were built around downtown Bridgeport. That approach makes these neighborhoods more attractive places and

the developments easier to maintain. Also, improving Bridgeport's main commercial neighborhood is BNT's strategic approach aimed at enhancing the local economy. Building and renovating quality affordable homes provides new housing opportunities for families with low and moderate incomes. House by house and apartment by apartment, the positive impact adds up. Neighborhoods improve. Communities prosper. BNT develops single-family residences, multi-family residences as well as 40-unit buildings, from historic Victorian villas to modern apartment buildings with ground floor retail space.

Property Management

Property Management is much more than maintenance alone. Important responsibilities include rent collections,

security, resident social services, and of course, building maintenance. Half of all our staff work in maintenance and security. They are committed to making our facilities safe, operational, and attractive places to live and work. As for security, BNT employs security personnel in each of its larger housing developments. While many of BNT's tenants suffered economic hardship due to COVID-19 and were unable to pay their rent, BNT utilized tools such as Connecticut's UniteCT emergency rental assistance program to help with rent payments.

In recent years property management has also provided resident services to help tenants with financial stability and quality of life issues. In 2021, BNT provided facemasks to guard against COVID-19, as well as groceries and meals during the pandemic. To do this, BNT worked in partnership with organizations such as Operation Hope, Bridgeport Rescue Mission, Catholic Charities and Bridgeport Hospital.
